Benefits of the service

Throughout the UK, many thousands of people benefit every week from the beneficial services provided by Pets As Therapy in hospitals, hospices, residential homes, nursing homes, day care centres, special needs schools, mainstream schools amongst others. Pets As Therapy offers this service to people of all ages and abilities, our service is entirely free to all of the establishments we visit.

At present over 6,000 Pets As Therapy volunteers are active throughout the UK with further requests for our service growing all the time. Thousands of establishments are currently receiving visits, with more on the waiting list.

Costs Of The Service

Volunteer Costs

The average cost to the charity per volunteer is £90 per year, of which £19 is generously met by subscription from the volunteers themselves, leaving a shortfall of £71 per volunteer per year - costs which must be met by the Charity.

Insurance

Pets As Therapy carry public liability insurance with an indemnity limit of £10 million, which the Charity has to pay for.

Staff

The Charity has a very small team of staff, unlike many other charities which normally employ many more staff. Our staff provide help and advice to the volunteer force, encourage new volunteer recruitment and develop the value and effectiveness of the Charity's service.

Running Costs

We must also take into account the cost of paper, envelopes, printing, legal costs, accountancy, temperament assessment and other training courses, postage, telephone, newsletters and many other items. For example, to send out just one sheet of paper to all of our volunteers would cost the Charity around £2000.

We hope this gives you some insight into the funding of the Pets As Therapy Charity and we are dedicated to providing the best possible service and support to both volunteers and visited establishments as well as the most cost-effective service for the Charity.
